

Former pro footballer and clubmate quizzed about €3m seizure of suspected heroin

Both men arrested are originally from Dublin and have connections to football clubs in the capital.

The younger suspect is a former professional footballer who has played for a number of Irish teams, and has also played in England. Sources said the footballer was not on the garda radar for involvement in organised crime.

It is being investigated if he became involved through the older male in custody who he met when they were with the same football club.

The 41-year-old is well-known to gardaí and has previous convictions for firearms offences.

He has also been questioned over a gun attack more than a decade ago which resulted in the victim suffering catastrophic injuries.

The man has been arrested over the attempted murder but to date has not been charged.

Gardaí believe he was present during an argument with the gun victim prior to the shooting. A total of nine people have been quizzed by detectives but no charges were ever brought in the case.

A source told the *Irish Inde*pendent: "The 41-year-old suspect is well-known to gardaí for previous crime and dissident connections.

"One line of inquiry is that he drew the younger man into criminality after they got to know each other at a wellknown Dublin football club.

"There is no doubt gardaí have disrupted a significant criminal operation with this

drugs bust," the source added. The two men are being held at Blanchardstown garda station under drug-trafficking

legislation and can be held for

up to seven days.

The operation was carried out by detectives attached to the Drugs and Organised Crime Bureau (DOCB) as part of an intelligence-led operation with Revenue's Customs Service.

Det Chief Supt Angela Willis, who is in charge of the DOCB, said: "The outcome of co-operation between Revenue and Customs and An Garda Síochána has resulted in the seizure of a significant quantity of heroin from circulation within communities that are suffering the consequences of drug trafficking."

The Revenue said the "collaboration between both agencies, as well as international colleagues, was significant in the successful outcome of this operation".

"This operation was part of Revenue's ongoing joint investigations targeting the importation of illegal drugs. If businesses or members of the public have any information regarding drug smuggling, they can contact Revenue in confidence on Confidential Phone Number 1800 295 295," a Revenue spokesperson said.

Both agencies said that investigations into the major heroin seizure are continuing.

The €3m heroin seizure is one of the largest individual drugs busts in the State so far this year. In the first six months of 2020 the DOCB seized €13.6m worth of drugs, 13 firearms, 2,000 rounds of ammunition and €3.6m cash.
