No drugs ... but Amy drank herself to death in binges

AMY WINEHOUSE drank herself to death. That was the ruling of a coroner's inquest into the death of the Grammy-winning soul singer, who died with empty vodka bottles in her room and lethal amounts of alcohol in her blood.

Coroner Suzanne Greenaway gave a verdict of death by misadventure yesterday, saying the singer suffered accidental alcohol poisoning when she resumed drinking after weeks of abstinence.

She was more than five times the British drink-driving limit.

She said: "The unintended consequence of such potentially fatal levels (of alcohol) was her sudden and unexpected death."

Amy (27) had fought a very public battle with drug and alcohol abuse for years, and there had been much speculation that she died from a drug overdose.

But a pathologist said the small amount of a drug prescribed to

help her cope with the symptoms of alcohol withdrawal had nothing to do with her death.

Instead, a resumption of heavy drinking killed the singer, bestknown for her tall beehive hairdos and Grammy-winning album Back to Black. A security guard found the star dead in bed at her London home on July 23.

"She's made tremendous efforts over the years," said Dr Christina Romete, who had treated Amy. But "she had her own way and was

very determined to do everything her way".

Amy gave up illicit drugs in 2008, but had swerved between heavy alcohol use and abstinence for a long time, Dr Romete said.

The singer had resumed drinking in the days before her death after staying away from alcohol for most of July. Dr Romete said she had warned Amy of the dangers of alcoholism.

"The advice I had given to Amy over a long period of time about all the effects alcohol can have on the system included respiratory, depression, heart, fertility and liver problems, and death."



ALCOHOL is a depressant. First, it reduces inhibitions, a familiar characteristic of inebriation. Then, as the level of alcohol in the blood rises, it becomes a poison.

At five times the legal imit for driving, Winehouse had drunk enough alcohol to kill her. At such levels, it interferes with the heartbeat, breathing and gag reflex. About 500 people are admitted to hospital each week with alcohol poisoning and there are

around 150 deaths a year. People die from heart attacks, because they stop breathing or because they inhale vomit into their lungs. Alcohol causes vomiting, which can be life threatening if the gag reflex isn't working. There is no min-

imum dose for poisoning.

Teen loses bid to stay in care

A VULNERABLE girl taken into the care of the HSE after arriving here alone from the Congo has lost a High Court action seeking the health services to continue to fund her care after she turned 18.

The girl was 16 when she arrived in Ireland in 2008 and remained in the care of the HSE until June 2010.

Mr Justice Paul Gilligan refused to grant orders quashing the Health Service Executive's (HSE) decision to cease providing the girl's care.

The girl's application for asylum status was refused and her application to remain on humanitarian grounds is being reviewed by the Minister for Justice.
